In the groom's class at the show they dressed the smallest girl (3 ft tall) in a brown dress, cov-

ered her in brown shoe polish, put her in a manure bucket and carried her into the show ring with a place card calling her – "The Little Turd". They won first place!

The other side of having deviant, demented and gross little urchins under foot at the horse shows was that my six-ton hitch made the ground shake as they stomped around the ring breathing fire. When we unhitched, six little Tinkerbells minus shoes, led them back to their stalls. At about 10:00pm, after six hours on full screech, I would find the little girls sitting in the mangers in front of their horse braiding the forelock, stroking their ears or putting baby oil on their muscles.

During the day while at the show, if a horse made manure the little girls tried to catch it with a shovel before it hit the stall floor. The six little devils kept score! When the horses made urine, it was a group effort, so not a single wet piece of sawdust remained. (They were not above making a human wall if one of them had to pee with the draft horse looking back to see what the tinkle was.)

Nighttime, we had six cots with sleeping bags, and I slept in the gooseneck of the horse trailer.

The downside to having the little girls in tow, it took me a day to get the crayon color out of the horses' tails from brushing against the walls of the stall covered in artwork – "I love Billy", "Ben loves me", "Boys are gross", etc. I tell you – they were a sight to see running across the show grounds with their yellow, red, and auburn hair shimmering in the sun. With all of the athleticism of a gazelle and the grace of a young thoroughbred!

They would fall asleep on the way home from the show. Filthy as a pig in the mud and in positions that would make me cringe. Inevitably one of them would stay awake and would end up asking me questions no man knows or is supposed to know (Lord help me!)

At home on Saturdays, I let the little girls take the horses to the lake. The little girls stand the horses in the water to jump off them, swim under them, and make them walk so they can be hauled through the water by the horse's tail. (oh, to be so young and carefree)

One of these little girls became a doctor, one a college professor, two became nurses, one a teacher and one became a stay at home Mom. I don't know where I went wrong?!

So, if you are thinking about hanging up the spurs, instead, think

about sharing the love of your life with a young boy or girl. They will reopen the book of life for you. Financially, young people cannot afford our sport, so if we don't share then we are looking at the slow death of a sport that we love. You might think you don't know enough to teach, but to a beginner, you have a wealth of knowledge. When you become a mentor – you become someone's hero! Go to a school and speak on horsemanship, your passion and how it evolved. Start someone down the road to what dreams are made of!

In the Box Seat . . . with Candy Smith

CONTINUOUS DRIVE... What is it?

Since this question has come up several times, it's time to publish something about the upcoming Steeplechase Farms Continuous Drive events (Jan 18th and Feb 15th).

Continuous Drives are headlined in the ADS Rulebook under Pleasure Driving Chapter 13. There, you will find the *Introduction* stating:

"The Continuous Driving Event (CD) consists of at least three ADS competitions driven consecutively and separated by brief rest periods. Competitors may be divided in divisions by experience, age, gender, horse size, etc."

Article 311 General Rules will definitely apply to the Steeplechase Farms CDs:

- A briefing meeting for competitors should be conducted by officials prior to the start to clarify any local conditions and to answer questions.
- The entry must be driven by the same person in all competitions unless otherwise specified by the organizer.
- All rules of the road should be observed unless designated officials direct otherwise.
- Spares are recommended but not required. Carrying a halter and lead rope on the vehicle is highly recommended.
- Outside assistance, other than as specified by the rules, will incur elimination.

 Entries eliminated from a competition are eligible to compete in the remaining competitions of the event.

The first disclaimer is that the Steeplechase Farms CD events will have additional and specific rules and guidelines to add to everyone's safety. The briefing will be conducted in the morning at least 30 minutes before the first competitor goes on course. Each turnout must have a SMV sign affixed to the carriage or cart since most of the tract will be on public lime rock roads. While pneumatic tires are quite acceptable, bicycle wheels (thin wire structure) will not be allowed from a safety perspective.

<u>The Competition</u>. Each Steeplechase Farms CD will have a total of four (4) phases, with each phase scored:

- Road Pace. Distance will be under 4km. Speeds will be posted for the different divisions. Driver must carry their green card with them (as in a CDE), and it is the driver's responsibility to ensure the card is updated and recorded by the official at the end of track with the time. Drivers may only walk or trot on track.
- Dressage Test. The driver will have time to leisurely walk their equine to the start of Dressage. A gate steward will advise if there is a hold, and there will be plenty of room to either walk or stand nearby. Test A will be utilized in January and Test B will be used in February.
- Road Pace. Driver returns to the track area and is to retrieve their green card from the official and acknowledge the start time assigned (within minutes). Official will count down and driver may then proceed on the 2nd track. Again, distance will be under 4km. Driver will again turn in their green card to the official at the end of track, ensuring the time is recorded.
- Cones. Cones course will not be walked in advance. The course will follow the format of Gamblers Choice with differing complexities of passage having different numeric values (these are not made known to the competitors). Cones will be marked with numbers for the scorers use; not an order of go. Driver will be given 2 minutes to correctly drive as many cones sets (yes, red on right is observed) as they can at a walk or trot to accumulate points. Cantering will be penalized.

At the conclusion of Cones, the driver will return to the trailer staging area (a nice distance to walk or trot) where final scoring will be done and awards given out.

Divisions and Awards. For 2023, the Divisions will be Training and Open (using Preliminary

Dressage tests). The Classes will be for Horse, Pony, Small Pony (must have ADS card or be moved up to Pony), and VSE. There will not be a distinction between Singles, Pairs or Multiples for purposes of awards. Awards will be given to the overall best scores for each Class/Division for 1st through 3rd place. All participants will receive a memento for their day.

<u>Entries</u>. The entry forms are on the Florida Whips website under events. Entries open on November 1st and close one week before each competition. Location is next to 12391 SE 21st PL, Morriston, FL 32668 in Steeplechase Farms subdivision near Black Prong Equestrian Village.

Miscellaneous.

- The conduct of the Steeplechase Farms CD events will be on multiple private properties and on public roads. As such, we ask that you do not bring your dogs to the event. If you are constrained to do so for personal reasons, your dog must be safely contained at your trailer throughout.
- A food vendor has agreed to be at the events (more on this later) and will have fresh breakfast and lunch offerings.
- Trailer parking is on private property and will not have facilities for water or electricity. Participants are encouraged to bring water for their horses. If there is a critical need, accommodations can be made at the adjacent farm.

There are more details about the competition, and these will be made available on the Facebook page "Steeplechase Farms Continuous Drive" along with pictures of the awards and memento being offered. The hint here is let's sparkle a little with Swarovski crystals.

Camp Black Prong 2022

What do you get when you have 110 people and 71 equines at Black Prong Equestrian Village in Bronson, Florida? You get a fun-filled and education packed carriage driving camp!

Camp Black Prong had 55 carriage drivers this year; to include 8 junior drivers – 4 boys and 4 girls, 34 auditors, 9 clinicians, 12 volunteers, and absolutely perfect weather!

Thursday, October 6t^h brought together experienced and new carriage drivers. Camp Black Prong had over 55 carriage drivers – the youngest was 7 years old. Camp had over "20" carriage drivers that had never attended an organized driving event before.

All the drivers had to go through a safety check and driving assessment with clinicians, Bob Giles, JR Hall and Charlotte Trentelman. Every driver was given a blue bracelet and beginners were also given an additional orange bracelet. (The orange bracelet let the clinicians and other drivers know that the driver with orange was new – added layer of safety at camp).

After lunch the educational classes kicked off. Hitching and Unhitching Safely was taught by Bob Giles. Carriage Maintenance was taught by Mark Navratil. A tandem driving history lesson was given in the main pavilion followed by a demonstration in the main dressage arena. Campers were also given the opportunity to try driving tandem! The first day of camp was not finished



yet! To end the day at the pavilion with a welcome party to be followed by a Navigator Class taught by Elizabeth Keathley and Anne Raisner.

Friday, October 7th found everyone very busy as the mini lessons with the clinicians started at 8 am! Charlotte Trentelman and JR Hall were working with the beginner drivers on dressage and cones. Bob Giles was at "The Splash" getting everyone wet! Muffy Seaton was doing "Drive A Test" in the main dressage arena. Heike Bean, Gary Yeager, Larry Poulin and Elizabeth Keathley were working with the drivers on basics, dressage, cones, and marathon hazards. The morning found all the drivers very busy as they went from one clinician to the next for their mini lesson!

At noon was the lunch break and everyone was talking about their morning experiences. After lunch found drivers attending private lessons, educational classes, and the safari drive. Charlotte Trentelman taught De-Mystifying the Judges Mind. Can You Drive with Para-Driver

Aids was taught by Bob Giles and Chris Carswell. A junior driver only class was held from 4-6 PM in the Crazy Cones field – allowing camp clinicians to work more one-on-one with the juniors. After dinner, campers had the opportunity to attend the last class of the day – How to Figure Your Marathon Times/Green Cards/Stop Watches taught by Elizabeth Keathley and Anne Raisner.



Saturday, October 9th greeted the campers with another morning of mini lessons with the 9 clinicians! Charlotte Trentelman and JR Hall were working with the beginner drivers on dressage and cones. Bob Giles was at "The Splash" getting everyone wet! Muffy Seaton was doing "Drive A Test" in the main dressage arena. Boots Wright, Heike Bean, Gary Yeager, Larry Poulin and Elizabeth Keathley were working with the drivers on basics, dressage, cones, and marathon hazards.

At noon was the lunch break that was filled with the excitement of the last two days of lessons and educational experiences – so much positive energy being generated at camp about carriage driving! Our clinicians were doing a fantastic job! At 1pm the Safari Drive Course opened for the 2nd day – so many animals to find! The junior drivers had another session with the clinicians from 1-3 PM at the Crazy Cones field. The Crazy



Cones Course opened for competition at 3 PM. It was so much fun watching the drivers go



through each of the elements – my favorite element was the singing of the A, B, Cs! Plenty of laughter during the competition.

Bob Giles hosted a "derby class" at 4 PM – allowing the drivers and the auditors a chance to learn how to properly plan and navigate a derby course. His class was followed by a demonstration.

Dinner was followed by the selection of 6 derby driving teams in preparation for Sunday's derby. At 7:30 PM the campers had the opportunity to attend a class – "Preventative Maintenance on Your Equine Athlete" taught by Dr. Tracy Ferrell-Roberts, DVM.

Sunday, October 9th, sadly it is the last day of camp, but thankful for the absolutely perfect weather for the derby! The derby started on time at 9:30am and 30 carriage drivers successfully navigated the derby course! Many of the drivers experienced a derby course for the first time at camp. The support could be heard from everyone watching as they cheered, encouraged, and coached drivers through the course! The smiles and joy were palpable! Lunch found everyone gathered in the pavilion to receive their awards – team derby, crazy cones, and the safari drive. This closed out a very successful and well received Camp Black Prong.

My Near Death Experience With My Dream Horse

I took my horse Versace out for a conditioning drive thru the Goethe Forest. On the way home we pass a wooded lot that has a dog that rushes the fence but doesn't bark. He's known locally as the "Stealth Dog" and a lot of riders have gone off their mounts because of this dog.

As we were approaching the dog's yard, I said to my husband "We have to look out for the "Stealth Dog". I had my husband dismount the carriage to get to Versace's head. Before he could get there, the dog comes charging the fence. Versace spooks, rears up and spins around on his back legs away from the direction of the dog. In doing so, he is about to land on top of a neighbor's mailbox. This mailbox is one of those decorative cast iron mailboxes with a statue of a horse on top. If my horse lands on that, he would most certainly get impaled. It also happened to be trash day so their plastic garbage can was sitting beside the mailbox. In a split second I determined the lesser of the two evils would be to land on the plastic garbage can which would cause less injury. So, I jerked the reins as hard as I could to the right to miss the mailbox and landed on the garbage can. Versace took off like a shot at a dead run!Unfortunately, the trash can is now wedged between my carriage axles and we are dragging it down the limerock road. The noise the garbage can is making sounds like a roaring lion as we are dragging it. Versace is literally running for his life! Visions of getting seriously injured or killed are flashing through my mind. This is not going to end well!

I'm standing on the carriage brake pedal, the wheels are locked up and I'm pulling back on the reins with all my might. Nothing is slowing him down. The carriage is fishtailing wildly. Versace is now veering toward the side of the road which has about a 6" raised edge. Without my husband on the back for balance, the carriage will surely flip over when it hits that edge. We hit it and the carriage rocks back and forth but surprisingly doesn't flip over. What it did do was dislodge the roaring lion garbage can from under my carriage.
